

What's New with School Bus Safety? Part 1 of 2

This is the first of a two-part train-the-trainer workshop that will address what's new in school bus safety and the installation of safety restraints in school buses. It will also provide an overview of a new NHTSA 8-hour curriculum designed to train school bus personnel to correctly install safety restraints that will be available later this year. Certified CPS technicians or instructors must teach the curriculum. Because the unique issues regarding school buses are not taught in the 32-hour certification class, most CPS practitioners do not have the experience and knowledge needed to teach the 8-hour class. This workshop is designed to fill that gap. Part 1 will focus on the top 10 mistakes of installing safety restraints on buses.


