An assessment is a peer review of a program area. Results of an assessment belong to the Highway Safety Office.

## WHAT STEPS ARE INVOLVED?

- The State Highway Safety Office decides it needs/wants an assessment.
- In order to meet the requirements of MAP-21, the assessment is required.
- The SHSO voluntarily requests an assessment because it wants to continually improve its programs.
- 2. The SHSO works with NHTSA to schedule and make arrangements.

## WHAT STEPS ARE INVOLVED?

 NHTSA identifies a team of subject matter experts to provide peer review.

# WHAT STEPS ARE INVOLVED?

- The SHSO provides volumes of information to the team and selects individuals for the team to interview.
- Based on the information and interviews, the team identifies program strengths and makes recommendations for the State to consider.

• New program ideas (e.g. social media)









• Support to move forward on potentially controversial activities (e.g. legislation)

## What can an assessment give you?

- New ways to do things (e.g. Occupant Protection)
  - Ideas for new partners
  - Ways to expand the program (seat belt enforcement zones)



## What can an assessment give you?

- New ways to do things
  - Nighttime seat belt enforcement
  - Evaluate child passenger safety efforts (Conduct a CPS observation survey)
