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License applicants with medical impairments

- As in many states, Missouri license office professionals report applicants for review if medically impaired (Meuser et al., 2008)
- The Encounters Training helps professionals identify applicants who have impairments of vision, movement, or thinking/memory that could impact the ability to drive

Enhanced Training

- Who created the training?
 - Licensing officials, highway safety specialists, researchers, and medical professionals
- How long is the training?
 - \circ The training was designed to take about 30 minutes
- What does the training cover?
 - Major symptoms of conditions that may impair the ability to drive safely
 - × Specific conditions include dementia, Parkinson's disease, macular degeneration, etc. (Staplin, 2012)



Training Structure • 4 modules for each phase of the license renewal process: • Walking to the Counter • Exchanging Information • Vision Testing • State Reporting

Within Each Module



- Each module has 3 sections:
 - $\circ\,$ Information about the renewal process and the observable symptoms of impairment
 - $\,\circ\,$ Video scenarios, using actors, that show symptoms to look for
 - O Quizzes to test for mastery





Designed for Sharing



- Only one module (State Reporting) has state-specific information
- Open source web design can be easily modified for different states/jurisdictions
- Simple and straightforward language



Conclusions

- Simple, web-based training on observable symptoms of conditions that may impair the ability to drive
- Training on impairment may reduce "coaching," where applicants are heavily assisted through renewal process, or not reported for evaluation
- Reporting unfit drivers at license renewal is more appropriate than reporting them after MVC
